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

GREAT PLENARY LEADERS



The Right Hon Patricia Hewitt

Patricia Hewitt was appointed Secretary of State for Health in Britain in May 2005. She was formerly Minister for Small Business and E-Commerce at the Department of Trade and Industry, Economic Secretary at the Treasury and Secretary of State at the Department of Trade and Industry. A Member of the British Parliament since 1997, she was also Deputy Director of the Institute for Public Policy Research, and Director of Research for Andersen Consulting. Before taking up her Ministerial post, Ms Hewitt was Deputy Chair of the Commission for Social Justice and was a member of the Social Security Select Committee.



Professor David W Bates

Dr. Bates is Chief, Division of General Medicine, Brigham and Women's Hospital, and is a practicing general internist. He also serves as Medical Director of Clinical and Quality Analysis for Partner's Healthcare Systems. He is a Professor of Medicine at Harvard Medical School and Professor of Health Policy and Management at the Harvard School of Public Health. He has been elected to the Institute of Medicine, the American Society for Clinical Investigation, and the American College of Medical Informatics. Trained as a clinical epidemiologist, his primary interest has been the use of computer systems to improve patient care, especially drug safety.



Sir Liam Donaldson

In 1998, Professor Sir Liam Donaldson, MSc, MD, FRCS(Ed), FFPHM, FRCP, FRCP(Ed), FmedSci, FRCA, became the fifteenth Chief Medical Officer for England and is chief advisor on all health issues. He is a member of the European Chief Medical Officer's Committee and also leads WHO's Global Patient Safety Alliance. He holds an honorary Chair in Applied Epidemiology at the University of Newcastle upon Tyne. Sir Liam has a prolific publication record including a standard text book of public health and contributing chapters to a further 20 medical texts. He received a knighthood in 2002 in recognition of his achievements in health and health care.



Sir Brian Jarman

Brian Jarman was the Head of the Department of Primary Health Care and General Practice and Head of the Division of Primary Care and Populations Health Sciences, Imperial College School of Medicine until October 1998 and remains within the Division, as Emeritus Professor, where he heads the Dr Foster Unit. He also works on a part-time basis with Dr Don Berwick at the Institute for Healthcare Improvement in Boston. Brian Jarman has published extensively and his recent work has focused on calculating adjusted hospital death rates in England, Scotland, Canada, the USA, Netherlands and Sweden. He was President of the BMA from 2003-2004.



Professor Linda H Aiken

Linda H. Aiken, PhD, RN directs the Center for Health Outcomes and Policy Research and is the Claire M. Fagin Leadership Professor of Nursing and Professor of Sociology at the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia. Dr. Aiken is a prominent nurse researcher and an authority on the causes, consequences, and solutions for nurse shortages in the United States and around the world. Dr. Aiken has recently been selected as the inaugural recipient of the Baxter International Foundation's William B. Graham Prize for Health Services Research. She was also honored with the 2006 Raymond and Beverly Sackler Award for Sustained National Leadership in Research, by Research America.



Dr Beth Lilja Pedersen

As Director of the Danish Society for Patient Safety and Head of Department of Patient Safety at the Copenhagen Hospital Corporation Dr. Beth Lilja Pedersen is a recognized opinion leader in Patient Safety. In 1997 Dr. Pedersen achieved recognition as Specialist in Gynecology/ Obstetrics. She also serves as a member of the International Steering Committee for the new WHO Collaboration Centre on Patient Safety and the JCI European Regional Advisory Council along with other international activities.

Dr. Pedersen has published and edited several popular as well as scientific articles on patient safety and related subjects.



Professor Richard A Cooper

Richard A. Cooper, M.D. is a Professor of Medicine in the Leonard Davis Institute of Health Economics at the University of Pennsylvania. His career included being Director of Penn's Cancer Centre and as Executive Vice President and Dean of the Medical College of Wisconsin in Milwaukee, and later as Director of the Health Policy Institute. Dr. Cooper has been a scholar in both hematology and health policy. He has published over 50 papers about the health care workforce. His principal focus has been the development of models for projecting the future demand for physicians built around long-term economic and demographic trends. Most major U.S organizations now recognize the impending physician shortage and call for remedial actions. He also has brought understanding to the interrelationships among physicians and various nonphysician clinical disciplines.



Sir John Oldham

Sir John Oldham was appointed to create and head the UK National Primary Care Development Team (NPDT) which was launched in February 2000.

The Primary Care Collaborative is now the largest improvement programme in the world covering 32 million patients in 40 months and delivering 72% improvement in access to GPs and substantial reductions in mortality for patients with CHD and improvements in other long term illness

In 2000 John Oldham received the OBE for services to patients and in 2003 was awarded a knighthood for services to the NHS. He conducts workshops and presentations internationally and as a GP, he still undertake regular clinical sessions in his surgery, usually 2 days a week



Dr John Braithwaite

Dr John Braithwaite has written and co-authored several books which have won a number of prizes in the US and Europe from sociological, law and criminology associations and societies. He has undertaken empirical work on a wide variety of substantive domains of business regulation and is also interested in applying regulatory theory to crime prevention and peacemaking in international relations. He has been active for 30 years in social movement politics in Australia and internationally, and as a consultant to many regulatory agencies and advisory councils to the Prime Minister and Cabinet in Australia. Dr Braithwaite is currently completing work in the area of health and aged care and has embarked on a large program of research in the area of peace building and responsive governance.

Within the program, The Healthcare Commission, the health watchdog in England and Wales is hosting a series of workshops to bring together international experts, the latest evidence and case studies to explore the role of performance assessment. All regulatory systems come with tensions, for example, centralised standards and targets versus local innovation and autonomy; the burden of regulation versus the need for public reassurance.
